"HEROES OF RIGHTEOUSNESS"

--I--

- 1. [Read Text: <u>Ecclesiastes 3:1-8</u> and Pray]
- 2. From Lexington and Yorktown, to Gettysburg and Appomattox; from Verdun and Normandy, to Midway, Guadalcanal and Iwo Jima; from Inchon and Khe Sanh to Baghdad and Kabul; and even from stateside work during times of conflict to service around the world in times of peace,...
 - A--...Americans in the branches of our nation's military have served faithfully both at home and abroad over the last 200+ years to protect and preserve the causes of liberty and freedom.
 - B--My own father and both grandfathers served our country in this way, and many of you here today, either in person or worshipping online, have been/are among them, too.
 - C--Well, tomorrow (November 11th), we pause to celebrate and honor you and the nearly 18 million of your fellow Veterans ¹ for your service to our nation and the things it stands for.
 - D--And as we remember your service and sacrifice, I want to invite us all to consider three reasons why I think it's important for us to honor both you and them as what I'm calling "Heroes of Righteousness."

--II--

- 7. First, we honor you for your **COMMITMENT** to God through our country.
 - A--It's true that as Christians, our commitments to God and country are not always compatible -- sometimes we serve God *best* by standing up and speaking against injustices of the reigning authority. ²
 - B--But there are many more times in which God calls us to commitment precisely *through* the work and policies of our nation. ³
 - 1--Jesus illustrates this in his words from Mark 12:17 where, after showing his disciples a Roman coin, he then tells them "give to Caesar the things that are Caesar's, and give to God the things that are God's."

- 2--And in Romans 13:1-7, Paul tells Christians to be subject to their governments, for he says, "the authorities that exist have been instituted by God."
- D--Well, you as veterans have willingly followed Paul's advice (even if at times unknowingly) by answering the call of *GOD* through the authority of our nation -- and we honor you and those like you today for that commitment.
- 8. Second, we also honor you and all our veterans for your <u>CONVICTION</u> -- your dedication to those things you consider important enough to be willing to lay down your life to protect.
 - A--Sir Winston Churchill once said to "Never, never, never, give in! In anything great or small, large or petty...never give in, except to convictions of honor and good sense." 4
 - 1--Another author has said that "[In order] to measure a [person], note the <u>height</u> of [their] ideals, the <u>depth</u> of [their] convictions, the <u>breadth</u> of [their] sympathies, and the <u>length</u> of [their] sacrifices." ⁵
 - 2--In like fashion, Jesus himself says in Matthew 5:6&10 "Blessed are those who hunger & thirst for righteousness, for they will be filled.... Blessed are those who are persecuted for righteousness' sake, for theirs is the kingdom of heaven"
 - B--It's true that not all causes for which people fight or serve in a nation's armed forces are "honorable" or "righteous."
 - 1--Examples include medieval Christians fighting in the Crusades, Confederate armies in the Civil War, & the German & Japanese armies in World War II.
 - 2--But even though there's no such thing as an absolutely "pure" motivation for going to war, we dare not dishonor the conviction of those who believe so deeply in their cause they're willing to lay down their life for it.
- 9. A final reason today for us to honor you and all our veterans is because of your/their **COURAGE** -- and by this I don't just mean courage to face death in battle, but more importantly the courage to do the hard things which must often be done to protect and ensure justice and equity for all.
 - A--War and violence in *any* form (and for *any* reason) is a *tragic* thing that should be avoided, if possible ⁶ -- even one criteria of what's known as "Just War" theory used by Christians to justify war in some circumstances insists that war be the absolute *last* resort after all other options have been exhausted.
 - B--But when it *must* be employed -- as Verse 8 of today's scripture seems to imply -- it demands a moral courage and fortitude on the part of those who wage it.

- 1--Nineteenth-century preacher G.K. Chesterton once said that "Courage is almost a contradiction in terms, [as] it means a strong desire to <u>live</u> taking the form of a readiness to <u>die</u>." ⁷
- 2--And the courage I'm speaking of isn't just *any* type of courage -- it should have a certain shape to it. General Douglas MacArthur called it "Moral courage -- the courage of one's convictions, the courage to see things through [in a] world that is in a constant conspiracy against the brave. It's the age-old struggle of the roar of the crowd on one side & the voice of your conscience on the other." 8
- 3--Authentic courage, you see, always contains within it a sense of moral and ethical integrity. ⁹
- C--And whether He's recognized or acknowledged as such or not, it's actually *God Himself* who is the source of this kind of courage.
 - 1--Psalm 27:1-3, 14 -- "The Lord is my light and my salvation; whom shall I fear? The Lord is the stronghold of my life; of whom shall I be afraid? When evildoers assail me to devour my flesh -- my adversaries and foes -- they shall stumble and fall. Though an army encamp against me, my heart shall not fear; though war rise up against me, yet I will be confident." 10
 - 2--Courage, then, is not the *absence* of fear, but rather (in the words of Dorothy Bernard) *"fear that has said its prayers."* 11
- D--So, today we honor you and all our Veterans for your display and practice this kind of Godly, moral courage which dares to confront death itself by being willing to stand up and do those hard things which ensure freedom, justice, and righteousness.

--III--

- 10. Here, then, are three reasons for us to honor you, our Veterans, today as "Heroes of Righteousness": your **Commitment** to God through your country; your **Conviction** of things worth dying for; and your Godly, moral **Courage** to do whatever is necessary for the cause of freedom and justice.
- 11. Of course, these three qualities (commitment, conviction, courage) aren't *only* for Veterans.
- 12. Nevertheless, the real test (and challenge) for Veterans (and for ALL of us who follow Gods) is not the DEATH we might face, but the LIFE we must live after our service. ¹²

- A--That's why those of us who've *not* served in our nation's military owe not only a debt of THANKS to you, our Veterans, but also a debt of LIFE itself.
- B--Following the great Civil War battle of Gettysburg in 1863, Abraham Lincoln offered these words in part of his dedication speech for the cemetery there:

"It is for us, the <u>living</u>, to be dedicated here to the unfinished work which they who fought here have thus far so nobly advanced. It is... for us to be here dedicated to the great task remaining before us - that from these honored dead we take increased devotion to the cause for which they gave the last full measure of devotion - that we here highly resolve that these dead shall not have died in vain -- and that government of the people, by the people, for the people, shall not perish from the earth." ¹³

C--Considering this, I want to conclude by inviting us to watch a short video-clip from the movie <u>Saving Private Ryan</u> that reminds us of the importance of each of us (Veteran or not) doing all we can to make every part of our life count...
